# SECRTARY'S REPORT FROM MARCH MEETING



Expanding ones knowledege about blacksmithing seems infinite, especially for someone like me whose interest is in bladesmithing. I was fortunate enough to have been asked to conduct knife making workshops this year at the Bluebonnet Demo. Acquiring the lead in helping a class of interested students learn techniques about forging anything was beyond my wildest dreams, especially after taking classes from famous blacksmiths such as Mark Asberry, Lyle Wynn and William Bastos to name a few. My thanks to our Balcones Forge board of directors for the consideration and acknowledgement of my status in this particular field of blacksmithing.

The class also consisted of several seasoned and accomplished blacksmiths down to individuals that needed assistance in how to hold a hammer, but I can honestly say that the end product resulted in a functional as well as a blade that looked like the example I made for visual reference. Our friend and fellow bladesmith John Myer, assisted in coordinating student command of the metal to forge some very nice blades as well as quenching, and I could not have done it without his help. Thank you, John Myer! Attached are photos of knives after the tempering process.

Of note, Balcones Forge had 4 existing gas forges built under Jerry Achterberg's supervision, but we were able to acquire 6 other gas HELL'S FORGE's that worked equally as well in the knife class and Rachel David's class which used metal three times as thick as the knife steel.

The artistic sculptured piece forged by Rachel and her crew was the first time I had ever seen such large pieces of metal actually being forged. Every technique, tool and then some I never heard of were used in her process including the butcher tools that John Crochet and Jim Elliott made a few days earlier. Most interesting to me was the use of a hand held compression riveter that was used to upset a pieces of round rod into an oval shape to form the base for the five interesting top forms.

After the sculpture was completed, I am sure there were as many individual interpretations and impressions perceived as there were admirers. I was doing my best to come up with purpose, function or representation as the forged piece was presented by the three gifted blacksmiths. My opportunity was soon awarded and apologetically, I told Rachel that my grandmother's tool shed had several old cotton hoes that had the same curved convex and round nose that graced her work. To my surprise, she said that was exactly what it was, a hoedag and gave me a little pat on the back. Whether it was or wasn't, she was successful in gaining even more of my admiration. Job well done, Rachel!

# A Review of Our 2019 Bluebonnet Demo

This year's Bluebonnet Demo marked the 20th year that we have sponsored an annual demo. As always, it came with a few surprises. This year, the auction was small. The caterer literally NEVER showed up. (Yes, that really happened!) And the best surprise of all...it was still a success, thanks to a terrific show from our blacksmith demonstrator, **Rachel David**, and her crew.

We have been fortunate over the years to have some incredible blacksmiths here for our demos; big name "celebrity" blacksmiths like Robb Gunter, Uri Hofi, Elizabeth Brim, George Dixon, and Mark Aspery. This particular demo, however, generated more discussion and more interest from our Balcones Forge members than we have seen in many years.

Rachel David operates "Red Metal" in New Orleans, Louisiana. She considers herself a "post-industrial blacksmith". That term did not mean a lot to me until I saw her working at the forge. She obviously draws inspiration from the "industrial age" forgings of the early 1900's. To really get a grasp of this, just think "locomotives and other huge iron machines". This time in history was the culmination of the industrial revolution. It was the age of giant steam hammers and a time when blacksmiths really did forge the parts for great locomotives, steamships, and the components of industry. There is a method and order to the forging of large components like crankshafts, U-bolts and such that allows for the systematic working of "big iron". Rachel has taken advantage of that to produce unique "statement" sculptures, as well as furniture and architectural work that is different and arresting.

Our "post-industrial" demonstration included a lot of yellow-hot big iron work at the power hammer, a lot of careful striking and butchering at the anvil, a number of stints with a very loud pneumatic air hammer, a few magic tricks, and a lot of what Rachel terms "mayhem"!

The final result was a beautiful iron sculpture that we will auction off to some lucky bidder. I have included a few pictures of the final sculpture for those who might have missed out on the mayhem.

I was fortunate to be in on some deep discussions over the next two days with several of our most experienced blacksmiths. Many of us were already at least somewhat familiar with the concept of industrial forging techniques, but watching Rachel adapt those methods to her very modern work was an eye opening experience. To be very clear, Rachel is NOT using industrial techniques to recreate antique locomotive parts.

She is utilizing these techniques to build her own commissions, components, and sculptures and to make an artistic statement that addresses the social inequalities, systemic prejudices, and the need for community that she cares deeply about.

For those of you who are interested in Industrial Age forgings, take a look at "Blacksmith's Manual Illustrated" by J.W. Lillico. You will learn how to forge swages, axes, cranes, thumbscrews, and stamping dies, as well as brake shafts and other parts for your own personal steam locomotive.



From August 19th through 30th, Rachel will be teaching a sculpture workshop at the New Agrarian School in northwest Montana. (newagrarianschool.org)




