

#### SECRTARY'S REPORT DEC 2017

The anticipation of getting to see Sue & Randy's blackshop met all my expectations and delighted me with even more useful tools, work tables, and



overall layout. The forge to anvil to power hammer is geometrically designed to allow efficient and unobstructed work area. The neatness was obvious with everything in it's place, so much so that it looked like kinda it was staged for a special youtube action video and with

the demonstration Sue had in store for us, it would have been a multiviewed video, indeed. Thanks to Robin Ream, who took some wonderful closeup photos that Vince will professionally edit for the readers pleasure and curiosity.

The competition item for this event was something forged by utilizing the basic design of the Fredrich cross. Sue was successful in winning first place with a hanging flower basket holder, the bottom and top oppositely constructed to create the unique design. Sue went on with her demonstration of forging "fiddlehead fern fronds" using hammer & special made rounding chisel as well as the power hammer. Her numerous display of various styles was very impressive and a pleasure to see.

A pertinent question from the crowd addressed her technique or method in rust prevention. Wire brushing the finished piece and applying a clear coat of Rustoleum was her technique and John Crochet endorsed the procedure as being the best method, of which he referred to as the 'rattlecan' style. Tom Leining (AKA Tom the Blacksmith, Wimberly, Texas) indicated that he uses BIOshield from Germany which has 3-4 different waxes and oils and secretly mixes them for a successful oil coating product to prevent rust.

Jerry A. and myself had a chance to research (ie trial & error technique) what steel makes the best flint striker and how to successfully obtain proper steel hardness. Forging a Nicholson and Heller file seemed to be the best and then quenching in water produced the desired quality for obtaining a quality spark. My attempts to quench in oil was unsuccessful, so after consultation with Shane Tilton & George Graham I was able to get proper steel quality by quenching in water, also.

Jerry also explained some in's and out's about leg vises. Utilizing a welding torch to heat the vertical jaw support shaft and then bend it into proper alignment of the jaws. Proper maintenance to prevent slag from obstructing function of the acme screw box, proper size thrust washer (usually tapered) and screw box washer. Precaution of preventing injury from the spindle arm by filing the outside stops and applying rubber around the round upset ends. Rebending the spring with sufficient heat to maximize it's capability in keeping jaws open, and no special annealing or quenching is necessary, just throw it on the ground and let it air cool.

The demo's for the day were infomative, the competition event was participated by a large number on contestants, the Frito-pie lunch was on an onspot favorite, the mingling and talking with others always a pleasure. Thanks to Sue & Randy, and all the help she enlisted to make this a wonderful blacksmith demo for Balcones Forge

The Combo-Demo will feature 3 smiths in the morning and 3 after lunch.

The morning session will showcase Wayne Phifer from Maurice, Louisiana. Learn more about Wayne at irontonforge.com or Ironton Forge on Facebook. Wayne started his career as a farrier who supplemented his income forging decor for restaurants. One thing led to another and he now specializes in High End Residential Lighting and Fireplace accessories. Wayne will forge his signature dragon head tongs and the flat bar braid. He'll do a little work with the Nazel 3B power hammer.

Sharing the stage will be Mark Ling from College Station, Teaxs. Mark is a 15 year old high school student whose hand hammer skills exceed his age by several years. Mark will hand forge several small natural elements demonstrating many forging processes and techniques. Then Mark will be assisted by Thomas Shumate, of College Station, who will strike for him as they make a hot cut hardy and a cupping tool. These two are fun to watch.

After lunch, well known Kelly Kring from Brookhaven College in Dallas with two of his teaching assistants, John Haskins and Sarah Ross, will forge a meat skewer on a 3 leg stand with a bowl ring below. 
## MISSING TONGS FROM DECEMBER MEETING
