### SECRETARY'S REPORT



Minutes of the Meeting Saturday, December 11, 2010 Boerne Agricultural Heritage Museum

The December meeting was held early this year to avoid conflict with Christmas holidays. This was our first meeting at the Agricultural Heritage Museum in Boerne. The Museum features a wide variety of exhibits of antique farm machinery and horse-drawn implements, as well as antique woodworking and metal working tools. Of course, the centerpiece is a very large, well equipped blacksmith shop with a number of anvils and forges, swage blocks and other necessary tools.

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 am by President Jerry Achterberg. We were welcomed to the Museum by Balcones member Joe Travieso, who provided a brief explanation of the Museum and the blacksmith shop.

Vice President Jerry Whitley discussed the possibility of having the January meeting at the San Antonio Botanical Center which will be holding an exhibit of ironwork, including pieces from Albert Paley and George Schroeder. If this venue cannot be worked out for the January meeting, Balcones member James Helm graciously offered the use of his blacksmith shop as an alternative. Thanks, James.

The February meeting will be a joint meeting in Bryan, Texas with the Houston Area Blacksmiths Association, hosted by Alan, Jeff, and Carlton Lee. This promises to be a real highlight of a meeting with demos and powerhammer work by the Lee family. In keeping with the big event there will be a special trade item; everyone is requested to make a tomahawk from a ball pein hammer, in the tradition of the trade hawks of the 1800's. Each member will get to keep his own hawk and a prize will be awarded for "Best Hawk". This meeting will be held on Saturday, February 19th. Put it on your calendar! Car-pooling arrangements will be discussed at the January meeting.

Jerry Achterberg explained how to easily modify a pair of tongs to make a "Hammer-head Tong" to hold hammer heads for forging tomahawks. These are easily made from almost any old pair of tongs and make forging a tomahawk much easier.

The March meeting will be held at Zilker Park in conjunction with the Zilker Park Festival. We will be operating the old blacksmith shop by the rose garden in Zilker Botanical Gardens.

April's meeting will be our annual Bluebonnet Demo at Sycamore Creek Ranch in Marble Falls. Our demonstrator will be hammermaster Brian Brazeal.

May's meeting will be the annual Western Swingfest on the courthouse square at San Marcos. Dress western and plan to show the public how

This was a well attended meeting with over twenty members showing up, despite an earlier-than-usual meeting date. The Museum is an excellent place for a meeting and we look forward to more meetings there in the future. Very special thanks to Joe Travieso for his hospitality!

This class was first taught by our good friend Fred Caylor of Zionsville, Indiana. We carry on his tradition of teaching how to make Little Giants run well and hit hard.

This 2 ½ day class is a hands-on format. You will help transform a 25 LB Little Giant hammer from functional but sloppy condition into a well tuned, quiet, hard working hammer. Sid Suedmeier, owner of Little Giant, will share all his knowledge and experience gained from working with Fred and from 20 years of repairing and rebuilding Little Giants.

An old style 25 LB Little Giant will be rebuilt during the class, and a new style machine will be on hand to demonstrate proper assembly and adjustment of both styles.

The class is held in our shop in historical Nebraska City, Nebraska. The city has a wide variety of cafes, outlets (including Pendleton Woolen Mills), antique and gift shops, orchards, wineries and museums.

### IF YOU HAVE A LITTLE GIANT, THIS CLASS IS FOR YOU!

No experience is required to attend this class. Past students have ranged from age 15 to 90, and from all walks of life. Anyone who wants to learn will benefit from this class. We approach the rebuilding process using tools that can be found in the average home workshop.

If you are in the market to buy a power hammer, this class will make you an educated shopper. If you already own a Little Giant, or any other brand of power hammer, this class will teach you how to get the best performance possible.

The class costs \$95, refundable up to 7 days prior to the class; advance registration is required. We limit the class to 25 participants. The class starts at 9 AM sharp on Friday, and usually ends by Saturday evening. The schedule runs Sunday until noon in case we encounter any exceptional problems in rebuilding, and to answer remaining questions.

When we receive your registration, we will send you a city map, along with travel and hotel information.

Airports are located in Omaha (45 miles north), Lincoln (50 miles west) and Kansas City (125 miles south).


### Directions from Austin:




