

SECRTARY'S REPORT FROM OCTOBER MEETING



Our Balcones Forge meeting in Devine, Texas at Jerry Whitley's Rustyk Forge featured Tom Lundguist from Onalaska, Texas. This seasoned blacksmith started out his demo by forging a bottle opener in the form of a mouse. Now this may seem like a simple project to some, but I noticed great interest from the crowd and lots of photos were taken. As we all know, there are a lot of steps to produce a quality blacksmith project and Tom made sure he verbalized each step. Another neat project was an iron rose (again using 1x1/8" flat stock), and larger the stock - larger the rose. Since he has a lot of acquaintances that shoot black powder rifles, he used 3/8 square stock to forge a screwdriver for tightening rifle screws with a point on the other end for cleaning out the blackpowder fuse orifice. A handy little tool that necessitated quenching and drawing back to a proper temper.

Jerry Achteberg called the assembly to attention in order to discuss our next meeting in December at the forge of Gerald Pollard on Dec 14, but at the time of this printing, that meeting has been postponed. Jerry Whitley read the list of deceased blacksmiths and friends of the Balcones Forge Blacksmith group. The ringing of the anvil took

place in their honor and lunch prepared by Marsha Whitley was served. I had an opportunity to have lunch next to Tom who explained his part in making of the movie Last of The Mohicans, a book written by James Fenimore Cooper. The film produced in 1992 by Michael Mann grossed over 75.5 million dollars, and cost about 6 million to build. The Fort William Henry replica was built in the North Carolina Blue Ridge Mountains, instead of the Adirondacks in upper New York state because of the heavy logging that has taken place over the years. Tom said he and his brother forged dozens of hinges, hooks, door handles and just about every little thing necessary in order to make the set appear period authenic. The original fort was built by the French and the battle took place in 1757. Several months prior to release, Tom said that actors, directors and supportive staff spent months mingling together with builders of the set and he got to meet a lot of interesting people. A list of the craftsmen including the blacksmiths are identified in Country Life magazine (1981). Tom is very proud of the part he played (shall we mention worked) in the making of that movie.

After lunch, he went back out to the forge for one-on-one forging for anyone that wanted a little hammer time with him. I also got to see a small collection of his handmade knives which are built for everyday function, and not end up on a shelf somewhere. For more of his work, he plans on being at the Lee brothers demonstration in February 2020. If you haven't been yet, better go because Allen stated that this would be their last event. I will also be meeting in mid November with the Reforged bladesmithing group at Cheryl Craig's shop along with Jerry Achteberg & John Meyer to present them with the four pair of tongs being donated to them by Balcones.


