#### SECRETARY'S REPORT

The February Balcones Forge meeting was hosted by John Van Strien in his really nice new shop in South Austin. We had at least 28 people attend.

John got to travel to Europe in 2004 and while there, he took many photos of the Art Nouveau architecture. His first presentation was a good slide show of architectural work by Antonio Gaudi, of Barcelona, and Victor Horta, of Brussels. There were some extremely intricate and some really wild buildings, gates and other architectural structures created by them. John had lots of slides, so he took a break from the show half way through to present information on new types of lighting that will be valuable for artists.

John, who has an electrical engineering background, has been working with new ways to show off his work or incorporate lighting into it. He began the lighting discussion with a basic demonstration on safely wiring up lights and measuring volts and amps with a dimmer switch. Then, he let us know that the future of lighting will be the LEDs. They are much more efficient than incandescent lighting. Although LEDs have been around for 20-30 years, manufacturers have just recently been able to make them brighter, warmer and cheaper. You can even get replacements for incandescent bulbs. John showed us several cool types of LED light products, but the product that created the biggest stir was a very flat, flexible light made by Ceelite. It looked like a thin sheet of plastic, but emitted light. The flat panel made long-time photographer, Harry Cabluck, drool (Harry, I mean that in a good way!!) One other interesting product was electraluminescent wire in multi-colored plastic coating. All kinds of new options!

For anyone interested in checking out or purchasing LED lighting products, you can check superbrightleds.com or ledtronics.com. Ceelite, the manufacturer of the flat panels does not appear to sell the product on their website, seelite.com; however, you can buy them in Texas from TXlite. flatlightcreations.com.

The monthly trade item was "something riveted". We had six items: a nutcracker, two crosses, a spatula, an open-top box, and a heart. Just think, if you'd have brought in something riveted...you'd have been able to take one of these cool items home with you!

The big annual demo is coming up at the end of March, so don't forget to forge something for the auction or donate a tool you don't use. Get your registration forms in early so you're sure to have a seat. Time's-a-tickin'!

Finally, we have several members that have been dealing with serious health issues recently. We sure hope you guys feel better soon and just know that we're thinking of you and we're sending all the positive thoughts we can muster your way!

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


Harvey Wise resting at home with one of the Grand kids.

## Why We Volunteer by John Crouchet

In a week or so, we will all (I hope) be partying it up at our annual winter demo. Every year, Balcones Forge invites the best blacksmith we can find to come show us the tricks of the trade; the secrets of the fire. We will have a big dinner together, drink a few beers and spend a couple of golden days with our friends. For many of us, this is the best time of the year, and, while we welcome new folks and outsiders, the real truth is that this is OUR party. We do this one for US.

Our monthly meetings are usually set up the same way. We love to see a new person interested in the craft, but we really put on those meetings for our own instruction and benefit.


#### A FAVOR PLEASE...
