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SECRETARY'S REPORT

The February 2008 meeting was held at the Zilker Botanical Garden on Barton Springs Road in Austin, Texas.

Zilker Botanical Garden established by the City of Austin in 1962 covers several acres of the 351 acre Zilker Park. It is comprised of several theme gardens with paths between them, two of which lead to the blacksmith shop located approximately in the center of the garden. The blacksmith shop was actually an antique barn which was brought in and rebuilt on its present site. Prior to Balcones Forge's involvement it was hardly usable as a blacksmith shop. There was not enough workspace and few tools or even an operable forge. It did, though, have two anvils, one of which was in usable condition. Once renovations were begun the forge at the garden became the third blacksmith shop in Central Texas to be made functional by Balcones Forge. It is now very serviceable and, although small, is equipped with one of the very best side draft coal forges you would ever want to use. The shop is open on various weekends during the year with members of Balcones Forge demonstrating blacksmithing to the public.

Rudy Billings opened the meeting with several announcements:

Those of you who want to order a hooded sweatshirt should call or e-mail Sue Murray or one of the officers to order one. They are \$30.00 apiece.

There was a get well card to sign for Harvey Wise who is recovering from stomach ulcers and a card for Jaylon Loyd who recently became a new father. Best of luck to Harvey and congratulations from us all to Jaylon.

Anyone interested was invited to come to the new blacksmith shop in Rockdale, Texas. Volunteers were invited to sell any forged items they had to offer and to demonstrate blacksmithing to the public during their Festival on March 1st.

John Crouchet announced the need for volunteers to come to the Pioneer Museum in Fredericksburg,

Texas on March 17th -22nd to demonstrate for the public during the week long festival. They are expanding the grounds to 6 acres and plan larger festivities in the future. It's a fun time for all and you are encouraged to contact John to volunteer.

John also announced that the Bluebonnet Festival at Larry Crawford's shop will cost \$5.00 more at the door and everyone is urged to get their registration in early if possible. There is a registration form online at the Balcones Forge website.

Rudy reminded us all that there are quite a few panel locations available for anyone who wants to make one for the security screen at Zilker Botanical Garden blacksmith shop. Call or e-mail Rudy to sign up for one.

Rudy showed us several tools made by his ancestors at the Billings Tool Company in the 1800's which had ties to the Spencer and Colt companies. If you find a tool that is stamped with the Billings name you know you have one from a company with a rich history.

Terry Ross demonstrated how to make a decorative flower in a spiral form out of one piece of tapered steel 12" long and 5/16 or 3/8" in diameter. The flowers petal shapes are hammered out between spaced fullers with a straight peen followed with a ball peen. The petal segments are done one at a time and bent into a spiral form at the fullers. The straight peen is used for forming the shape and the ball peen is used to spread it from the center to a rounded shape. He called the resultant form a variation of a "Russian Rose".

Shannon Cassady who works at Herrera Iron Works in Austin, Texas showed us how to make a very nice drawer pull out of flat bar. He fullered a pointed spear shape on each end and rounded the piece long ways by hammering it into a fullering tool. He bent two 90 degree angles on each end so the spear points became the attachment points and it assumed the familiar shape of a drawer or cabinet door pull. He placed pebbles on the anvil and used them as a texturing media by hammering the material into the pebbles. Both Terry's and Shannon's demonstrations were very interesting and we thank them very much for their time and efforts.

We had 5 new members sign up at the meeting and we all welcome Joe, Ryan, David, Kirk, and Eldridge to our group.
