

#### SECRTARY'S REPORT

I am not sure about other blacksmith tail gaiting events across the USA, but the one I went to at Lee Brothers Steep Hollow Forge Works in Bryan, Texas on February 18 is certainly a contender

for not only large, but in variety as well. A written description might end up as several volumes because everything from coal, hammers, anvils, forges & tongs were in abundance from antique to new, as well. I had made a visual survey and of course, had a few things to decide about, when Ric Dawdy approached me about identifying some 1084 knife making steel on Mr. String-Bean's display. I had already been by there because I bought a well used fire pot from him last year and with a little bit of repair has turned out to be part of my travel forge. Needless to say, I had overlooked 10 pieces of my favorite knife making steel that is no longer in production. I bought half of it and the other 3 guys waiting on String-Bean bought the rest of it.

Because these demos by such talented blacksmiths inherently inspire me to hurry home and get back into my shop and make something, I really enjoy attending these events. The inspiration of design and to actually see the process unfold with such quality and ease of execution is both delightful and humbling. The small patch knife I made the next day after the Lee Bros. event was inspired by Bill Moffett who made several items out of titanium, then forged a knife from a leaf spring (being 5160 high carbon). Bill was forging close to where I was sitting and Matt Marti was the codemonstrator forging a hammer. I commented to a fellow blacksmith next to me about having made a few knives out of hay rake tines also of 5160 and the guy pulled out a very nice one he had made several years ago. Then I remembered that 3 inch piece of tine on my workbench and the desire to get back home and get it finished completely occupied me the rest of the day. My hope is not to bore readers of this article, but to encourage new blacksmiths to pursue their inspiration and for experienced smiths to present us with something new.

Today's crowd was even bigger than last year and Alan said he has made plans for the free event to be even larger next. A special area is set aside in the spacious shop for blacksmith exhibits and the quality of finished pieces are awesome in detail as well as structure. The competition item was a belt buckle and the range of presentation far exceeded what I expected. The visions and final finished piece of the participating craftmen (& women) was not only exceptional, but extraordinary evidenced by the continuous crowd of onlookers and their respectful comments. I was unable to get a photo of the presentation award buckles, but Sue Howeter was 1st, Lyle Wynn 2nd, and Robert Adulah was 3rd. Wonderful turnout of entries and congratulations to the winners.

Because I spent so much time visiting with Richard Delahoussa at the iron smelt and talking with various other blacksmsiths, I did was not able to see the demo from the Austin Metal Authority duo (Woodward & Brinkman) and only observed a few minutes of the demo by Tim Shaffer & Evan Wilson. As secretary for Balcones Forge, I apologize for not being able to report on these demonstrations but want everyone to know that if you weren't there, you missed a great performance even if you only got to see half of it.

This is the event that keeps Balcones Forge going by members donating to the auction and also bidding on item at the auction. I have seen a few items bought and then donated back a couple of vears later.


By the way, you can also contact Peter to sign up for the demo and to reserve a BBQ plate.

## CALL ME ANYTIME



#### **Best hamburgers:**

**Bill's Burgers, Wings & Things.** The BEST burgers in town. Maybe the best burgers anywhere! Located at 307 Main Street, Marble Falls, TX 78654. www.billsburgerswingsandthings.com.

Located by the giant oak tree at Old Oak Square on old Main Street. Indoor and outdoor seating. We love it! If your diet conscience is already hurting you, just order the kid burger (with fries)! My wife says this place has the BEST onion rings!

#### **Best chocolate:**

**Chocolatte.** Next door to Bill's Burgers at 807 3rd street in Old Oak Square.

You may want to stay out of this place if you are on a diet. Or, you can always just remind yourself that chocolate has healthy antioxidants! These folks make their own delicious pecan English toffee, in addition to a large selection of chocolate truffles and other goodies. While you are there, ask about the ghost of Old Oak Square!

#### **Best Lunch:**

**Noon Spoon Cafe.** Our friend, Jennifer Cayse, is the owner of this fine establishment located at 610 Broadway. (Broadway is actually 8th Street)

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# Welcome to the Ranch!

As long-time Balcones Forgers, it is always a thrill for Carolyn and I to welcome folks to the Bluebonnet Demo, both our old friends of many years and newcomers that we are meeting for the first time! We are fortunate to live in a beautiful place and we are pleased to share it with you. We hope you will bring your family and friends when you come.

We will have camping spots available around the big pond, down the hill from the blacksmith shop, so bring your tent or your travel trailer if you wish. There will be a porta potty placed in the camping area for your convenience. There is no electricity in the camping area.

### Things to Know

This a working cattle ranch, not a public park. We have some dangerous things here. We have rattlesnakes, scorpions, cactus, and several large ponds and flowing creeks with no lifeguards or safety barriers. We also have cliffs with sheer dropoffs and single lane gravel roads that go for miles with lots of blind curves and hills.

Never leave young children unattended on the ranch. Always use your flashlight when walking the roads or trails after dark. Do NOT bring your dog. All open fires are prohibited. Camp stoves are fine.

PLEASE DRIVE SLOWLY. Our roads are all single lane roads and you may meet oncoming traffic at any moment. Baby calves and baby deer will NOT get out of the road when they see your car coming.

Don't drive across the pastures.

Please do not litter. This is our home. If you see cigarette butts, bottle caps, or other litter, please pick it up.

No smoking at our house or at my shop.

Some of our family members also live on the ranch. Respect their privacy and, please, wave and smile when you see them. They are putting up with our yearly Blacksmith Invasion!

#### Don't Worry About These Things

**Chickens:** We have free roaming chickens around the house and shop. They will not hurt you and they are fun to watch. Even the old rooster is not aggressive. They will not let you pet them, however.

**Cattle:** Do not fear the cattle. Even the bulls are shy and not aggressive. They will not hurt you or your children. The baby calves are lots of fun to watch. Once they are a few weeks old, they will often bounce around the pastures, trying out their new legs.

**Coyotes:** You will hear our coyotes howling sometimes in the evenings. They will not harm you and will not approach humans at all. You are very unlikely to see one.

#### Things to See

There are lots of things to see here on the ranch.

**Birds:** If you are a birdwatcher, bring your binoculars. We have two or three Mexican eagles (Crested Caracara) living on the north end of the ranch. You are likely to see Great Blue Herons and white Great Egrets, especially near our north pond and flying down the creeks. We sometimes have Whistling Ducks, a rare bird in this area, nesting on the south end of the ranch. Around our house, you are very likely to see bluebirds, painted buntings, cardinals, purple martins, and red wing blackbirds. Look for cinnamon teal, mallards, and sometimes ospreys and kingfishers on the middle pond at the camping area. We have several resident roadrunners that you may encounter coming in on our long driveway. There are three flocks of wild turkeys on the ranch. You are very likely to see them strutting around the camping area in the early morning or late evening.

**Stars:** We are blessed with truly dark skies here in the Hill Country. You will have a fine view of the Milky Way and the Spring Constellations from almost anywhere on the ranch. If you bring binoculars or a telescope, you will have plenty of planets and stars to look at that may not be visible around bright city lights.

**Animals:** Watch for lots of baby deer in the springtime, along with rock squirrels, porcupines, and an occasional fox or bobcat.

**World Class Blacksmithing:** Don't forget the big show! Every year we try hard to do a better event than the previous ones. After seventeen years, that has set the bar pretty high! This year, we are pleased to have an all-star line up that will showcase Dana Flanders, Lyle Wynn, and my good friend, Dorothy Stiegler! All three of these blacksmiths will be forging and teaching at the same time in a (hopefully controlled) rush to the finish line!

We hope you will join us for the 2017 Bluebonnet Demo. Classes start Wednesday, March 29th.

## **Please Note:** These classes are an amazing opportunity to learn from world-class blacksmiths without the expense or difficulty of traveling across the country or paying huge lodging and instructional fees. **Balcones Forge is doing a great thing here. Please support it!**

Camping will be available starting Tuesday, March 28th, if you wish to arrive early for your Wednesday class.

Classes will continue each day on Thursday, March 30 and Friday, March 31 and the big Demo cranks up at 9:30am on April Fool's Day!

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## THE WEDGE JOINT




In January Caleb Cullman conducted a "Innovating with Joinery" class (see March 2010 issue THE ANVIL'S HORN – page7) at Sahuaro Ranch Park. One of the joints discussed and constructed was a WEDGE Joint. The following illustrates the components required and the material sizes we used during the exercise. The key to understanding the join – the vertical member's square slit and drifted hold must be big enough to allow the horizontal member and the wedge strap to fit thru it. Try it, it was a very good forging exercise.

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#### Driving Directions for the Bluebonnet Demo

The Bluebonnet Demo is at the usual location: John and Carolyn Crouchet's Sycamore Creek Ranch, outside Marble Falls. Lost? Need directions? Call John's cell phone at 830-798-3710.

From Austin, Take Hwy 71 and go north and west. You will pass through Bee Caves, over the Pedernales River, through Spicewood, over Double Horn Creek, and eventually come to the turnoff to the right to Marble Falls at Hwy 281. Depending on where you start from, it'll be about 60 miles. If you start from Vince's place in Bastrop, it'll be twice that!

From San Antonio, Take Hwy 281 North all the way to Marble Falls.

When you cross the Colorado River into Marble Falls, begin counting stoplights. The fifth stoplight you come to will be Ranch Road 1431. This is the biggest intersection in town. Turn right (east) onto Ranch Road 1431. (Check your odometer. You will go 5.6 more miles to our gate.) As you head out of Marble Falls on 1431, you will notice that you are on a winding, two-lane blacktop road with no shoulders. At the top of a long, winding hill, the road changes and suddenly has shoulders. Go fifty yards further and turn left into our driveway between the red reflectors. (Look for the "Anvil" signs.)

At our gate, you will see a large oak tree to the left and a small sign to the right that says, "Sycamore Creek Ranch, 5828 East Ranch Road 1431". If the gate is open, just drive on in. If the gate is closed, then there are cattle in this pasture, so please close the gate behind yourself once you enter.

Continue on down our driveway for one mile. You will cross four (count 'em...FOUR) cattleguards before you see the big metal shop on your left.

Welcome to the Ranch!!!

Okay, for you folks who want to come in from somewhere up north: Just take Hwy 29 from Georgetown (or wherever you get on it) and head to Burnet. At Burnet, take Hwy 281 south to Marble Falls. In the middle of Marble, turn left (east) onto Ranch Road 1431 and head for our gate.
