SECRTARY'S REPORT FROM FEBRUARY MEETING



Jerry Achterberg & I left the comfortably warm Bulverde area about 5:30 am this Saturday morning in blue jeans and light shirts with the A/C on and about half way to Brian, we stopped for a taco. We were shocked to find out the temperature difference was noticeably 20 degrees colder with an occasional misting of light rain. Luckily, I had an old carhart jacket and a pair of gloves in the back seat of my truck and after talking to a few other attendees, seems very few came properly attired. Throughout the day, the Richard DelaHoussaye iron smelt area was quite popular. Nevertheless, there was standing room only as the forging events started to unfold.

Two well known bladesmiths, Richard Epting and Peter (Cowboy) Symanski began forging a Damascus blade in the Ray Kirk (Mastersmith, American Bladesmith Society) style with an integral finger guard. Richard did a wonderful job in explaining each step that Cowboy forged into the blade, and there were quite a few important technical questions from the crowd. After normalizing and quenching, the TV watchers of Forged in Fire, of which there were many at this particular demo, were pleased that the blade did not warp.

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The hammer forged bottle opener had about 35 participants and the first & second place photos are pictured below. My somewhat ho-hum horse head opener from a horse shoe didn't even get tested by the judges but it was fun to make. After lunch and foot stomping music by Joe Magee, the auction began and one of the pricier items was a bundle of forging tools (see photo) donated by Lyle Wynn & Stan Bryant. Balcones forge member Matt Pohoresky did some unique forging and forge welding as did Sam Fontenot also demonstrated making a hammer. Also demonstrating blades forging in a seperate area were STAB members James Helmes, Alex Ruiz and Tobin Nieto. There were plenty of vendors today and forging hammers seemed to be very popular. Nathan Robertson sold over 30 hammers and I was very impressed with the hammers Haley Woodward (Austin Community College) had on display. Jerry & I delivered the 4 new forges and forge stands for Community First (Loaves & Fishes) group and Haley took them back to Austin with him.

I talked with Alan & Jeff Lee the next Saturday at a knife show in Bastrop, and they were well pleased with the outcome of the Steephollow demo, and plan on doing it again next year.

Patch Knife Class with Tim Tellander Journeyman Bladesmith American Bladesmith Society & Texas Knife Guild

This knife represents a knife used primarily during the American Civil War by riflemen to open patches of black powder for their muskets, of which the design and use is legendary and useful to the present. The 6 inch piece of high carbon steel (1095) is from a horse or tractor drawn hay rake for drawing fresh cut grass into rows for harvesting.

We will be utilizing gas forges, and the only tools needed is one hammer with both flat & rounded faces, and another with a cross peen. The actual forging and bending will take 3-4 hours, sharpening and heat treat will take the remainder of the day.

The photos identify the round bar and 2 differently sized examples and I forged a 3rd example to show completion. I had it tested by a knife guild member (Gary Powell), and it resulted in a Rockwell hardness of 61.

This is your chance to sign up for our annual blacksmithing workshops, held in conjunction with the Bluebonnet Demo!

We are offering four days of classes this year: March 28, Thursday - "**Patch knife making class**" with Tim Tellander March 29, Friday - "**Patch knife making class**" with Tim Tellander March 30, Saturday - Bluebonnet Demo March 31, Sunday - "**Butcher Tools, moving mass**" with Rachel David April 1, Monday - "**Butcher tools, moving mass**" with Rachel David

On Thursday and Friday before the Demo, our bladesmith extraordinaire, **Tim Tellander**, will be teaching classes on building patch knives. Tim will teach the entire process to forge, file, and finish a completed knife in this class. Balcones members have shown a tremendous interest in bladesmithing this year, and this is a great opportunity to forge your own knife, start to finish! Many of Tim's beautiful knives are shown in the Balcones Forge website gallery.

Our 2019 Bluebonnet Demo demonstrator is blacksmith **Rachel David** from New Orleans. You can see her work at *www.redmetal.net*. As you can see from her architectural and sculptural work, she is a master at shifting metal to achieve unusual, flowing forms. She will teach classes on the Sunday and Monday after the Demo focused on "calculating, isolating, and redistributing mass." This is a chance to take your forging abilities to the next level, learning methods and subtleties of using top and bottom butcher tools in your work.

These popular all day **workshops are limited to only ten students per day**. They will begin at 9:30 each morning and end at 4:30 each afternoon. Blacksmiths and metalworking students sign up for these workshops each year to learn new forging techniques in a hands-on shop environment without spending great wads of cash or traveling long distances.

Balcones Forge provides the anvils, forges, tools, and professional-level instructors.

Cost to take a class is \$125.00. All needed materials and tools will be furnished, along with lunch and drinks for everyone.

<u>Please Note:</u> Class size is limited and is available only on a "first come, first served" basis. If you wish to be in a class, apply quickly.

To sign up for a class, text Laura Armstrong at 830-605-6150. Tell her your email address and what class you want. She will send you an invoice by email which you can pay online by credit card or by ApplePay to reserve your space. If this does not work for you, call Laura directly and she can make other arrangements for you.

Due to our insurance requirements, you must be a Balcones Forge member to take these classes. Dues are a very reasonable twenty dollars per year and you can become a member immediately by contacting Rudy Billings at rudy@balconesforge.org.

SECRTARY'S REPORT FROM FORGING COMPETITION

My plan during the recent Austin Forging Competition on Hog Eye Road, was to identify one blacksmith team for each round of competition. Not knowing any of the competing blacksmiths and unaware of what unique piece was going to be forged added an additional curiosity for me as well as others. Their struggles for accuracy and uniformity are experienced by all of us, but rarely does something magnificent emerge from the fire. This must border on the old adage about your attitude,

not your aptitude, determines your altitude! -- so I am obviously flying too close to the ground.

Michael Dillon and David Ponsier paired up for the first round of competition today and the stainless steel media consisted of a 2X2 square foot of 1/8 steel which was folded and flattened to represent & honor & the Mobil Loaves & Fishes' commitment to the underprivileged individuals of this community. Albeit a delicate and interesting piece, my research about Michael & David substantiates the fact that these blacksmiths are highly regarded their originality and craftsmanship. The following paragraphs are quoted from Michael's website of which I hope the reader might further explore:

"Dillon Forge is located in Crabapple, Georgia - just north of Atlanta. Michael has more than twenty years experience producing both functional and non-representational metal sculptures. He works with iron, bronze, aluminum, stainless steel, and carved stone. My goal is to create a visual dialogue with each client that will result in highly crafted works of art. I enjoy the collaborative process and feel that the ongoing exchange with architects, clients and builders enhance and strengthen my work. Throughout a project, Michael generates concept drawings, scale drawings and sample models to further the understanding of the project for both the artist and the client. Heating metal red hot allows me to control the material in its briefly malleable state to create fluid and graceful structures." Michael attended Kansas City Art Institute and did his graduate studies abroad at the University of Georgia, Cortona, Italy. Regarding Michael's striker and talented blacksmith David Ponsier, I was not able to positively identify via my google search and definitely did not want to err in this regard.

Bushey Ironworks, composed of brothers Jesse and Aaron Bushey from Kings Beach, California. Double headed cobras were forge welded onto a candelabra stem, complimented with silver inlay of the candle vestibule was the focus of their forging today (see photo). I thoroughly enjoyed the synchronized technique in which both would become striker for the other and very little conversation other than thank you took place, mostly it was just a double hammer strike on the anvil. The following bio's were obtained from their web page, and again, I encourage you to examine this publication also. *"After high school in Cabot, Vermont, Jesse became an apprentice in Tahoe. After many ears of learning the trade, pursuing lessons from expert smiths across US & Europe, traveling to learn and living to forge, he finally called himself a blacksmith. Building intricate room dividers for a hotel located in Aman, Jordan is an example of some of his significant works as well as a wide array of ironwork styles in the Tahoe area. Aaron, by age 10 often visited his brothers shop and by age 12 had built his own 10X10 shop in his mom's backyard. The tiny shop packed a punch and he became the 'town smith' making signs and Christmas gifts. He is a full-time resident of Tahoe City and travels extensively across the US as well as Europe, but he is devoted to and significantly contributes to the success of Bushey Ironworks".*

I didn't hear anything about the two LAMA raffle tickets I purchased at the Lee Brother's regarding a prize consisting of an anvil & a workbox full of tools, so I'll entertain mid month at the Pioneer Museum in Fredricksburg. Looking forward to the knife making classes end of the month. Remember to bring a cross peen and rounding hammer, and I'll see you there.

Summertime Hammertime

Editor's Note. The following articles cover ideas that I have collected over the past few years. They are not by any stretch an exhaustive survey of hammers. However, they do provide insight into one of our essential tools and shed light on creating and maintaining them.

Hammertime - Revitalizing

I ground the face and then stood the hammer vertically in a solid fuel forge until about $\frac{1}{2}$ " of material was 1400°F or so. This pulled a brown temper color at the peen end – no big deal.

I quenched using a gallon jug of water, pouring it in a steady stream on the center of the face, again, holding the hammer vertically with the face uppermost. I allowed the water to run off the face until the water started to bead. I used a steady stream of water, not just a big dump over the face.


Note. Keep to the side when quenching, as it generates quite a bit of steam. Use a face shield for the cutting off and for the quenching.

The hammer held sufficient heat to pull a blue temper after polishing.

Why Temper?

For insight, these photos show a failed tool – slot punch, made of 4140. You can see how all the bits fit together, but note how different the grain structure is. You can see that the tool has a coarse grain structure toward the working end, demonstrating that the tool was not tempered sufficiently or that it was allowed to get too hot during use and was quenched without tempering. For strength,

you want the small grain structure that is achieved by tempering. ♠
