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


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SECRETARY'S REPORT FROM APRIL DEMO

This year's Bluebonnet Demo hosted Brett Moten, of Reno, Nevada and was accompanied by his



wife Felis. Bret had worked 20 years in the Reno area as a farrier and now has a successful artist blacksmith business know as Infinity Forge. An open forge is offered once a week and typically attracts 10-12 blacksmiths of which pay about \$20 for the

opportunity to have Bret assist with difficult techniques, demonstrate his style as well as answer questions. While I was talking with his wife Felis, she offered a tid-bit that describes the techniques and style about Bret's forging capabilities. She said that when Bret offers forging suggestions, the group wants to know how much more the difficult it's going to be to complete the project. The hands on forging project that Bret offered in the 2 day Balcones Forge workshops was a 3 prong coat rack that swiveled. Each step was carefully demonstrated to complete the joinery project as well as hammer forging the washers between each hook (see photo).

The Friday evening shrimp boil prepared by Dave & Elise Guerrero was superb, delicious and plentiful and the hospitality provided by John & Carolyn Crochet is always a lesson in kindness, appreciation and how to do things in a big Texas way.

Jerry Achterberg officially opened the Saturday demo with special thanks to the work crew that had set up the forging stations a couple weeks

before the actual demonstration and workshops could be utilized. Those included were John Crochet, Jim Elliot, Vince Herod, Rick Dawdy, Aaron Tilton, Rudy Billings, and Jerry Achterberg and without this unselfish effort, the event would not take place. Also, Balcones Forge acknowledged three Lifetime Membership Awards to Tom Lupton, Tom Leining, and Aaron Tilton. Bret Moten also presented Mr. James Hoenig with an engraved bronze plaque for his numerous years of dedication to the field of blacksmithing.

Saturday's demonstration enlisted a pair of coal forges with two talented and experienced blacksmiths at each as well as utilizing the main gas forge in the center of the workshop with several other smiths. These talented blacksmiths included Laura Armstrong, Dana Flanders, Stan Bryant, T. Hines, and Kevin Sorensen blacksmiths Thick slabs of steel were artistically molded into a base to accommodate the complex joinery of this bold statement of artistic beauty. For the limited talented 'me' to attempt description of the 10 hours of sophisticated blacksmithing skill & technique demonstrated by so many individuals, would not be worthy of their talents, but to emphasize the quality of this piece, it accepted the highest bid in the entire auction, if not more than everything else put together. Congratulations to Kari Nations and Michael Gibertini for the winning bid!

Along with other members of the board, thank you all for coming as well as participating in this memorable Balcones Forge event.

SECRETARY'S REPORT #2 From August Meeting

The trip to Sycamore Ranch in Marble Falls is one of those day trips one never gets tired of, and truck-sharing with a couple blacksmith buddies makes it even more enjoyable. Jerry Achterberg had just called the meeting to order just as we drove up and the plan for the day was unveiled. The primary focus was to build a blacksmith's tool box and

John Crochet took over from there by explaining that blacksmith interns were presented with this box at the end of their training and it allowed them to tote their tools from shop to shop until finding a job somewhere. All of the parts for the tool box were separated into individual bins, so with the assistance of Ruth Carter, John demonstrated the assembly of each piece.

The cost of the workshop which included a toolbox was free to Balcones Forge members, and about 30 individuals had signed up for the event. Typically, the majority of attendees to our blacksmith meetings have only an inkling about what it takes to prepare for any of our meetings and/or the time it takes to plan and setup. John had about half a dozen workstations set up with tools and the necessary screws, glue, and sanders for all of us to put our individual kits together. One of the most important people in helping to get this gig going, was Randy Howeter who cut all 6 pieces of lumber (TOTALING 180) into the correct and exact size. Not only did that take place behind the scene, but all the pilot holes were pre-drilled by John and Ruth, so it would be less likely for participants to make mistakes. Fortunately, I (with assistance from Ruth) was able to complete a functional toolbox. John had purchased 1/2 inch flat bar iron to go around the edges thereby protecting the box as well as adding integrity, strength, and durability.

Another behind the scenes scramble that occurs, is the \$10 delicious BBQ sandwiches that Carolyn Crouchet had ordered and picked up for this big hungry crowd, then invited us all into her home for a pleasant sit-down lunch in her kitchen. I don't know how many thank you's she got, but everyone meant a lot, so THANK YOU again Mrs. Crouchet!

Also, the Iron in The Hat was successful by netting a couple thousand dollars as well as quite a few blacksmiths obtaining some quality items for their forging projects.

Jerry intends to have everyone bring their toolboxes to our memorial forge meeting in Devine, at Jerry Whitley's Rustic Forge on October 27 where the boxes will be judged for originality in decoration and completion.

Must be self contained.






***Beginners Forging Lesson
At Wendish Festival***

Sunday, July 23

Next Sunday, September 23, John Crouchet will teach a short hands-on lesson for beginners on the techniques of tapering and scrolling. We will learn these basic blacksmithing techniques by forging traditional double-ended iron hooks.

Materials and tools for this lesson will be provided by Balcones Forge. All you will need to participate is a pair of safety glasses and, if you wish, your favorite forging hammer. Extra hammers will be available.

Due to our insurance requirements, you must be a Balcones Forge member if you wish to hammer hot iron with us. Membership dues are a very reasonable \$20 per year and can be paid at the meeting.

This short class is also an opportunity to brush up on your skills if you have not spent much time at the anvil over the summer! We will be using coal forges for this lesson, but the techniques are the same when using propane gas forges.

Pennsic Blacksmithing adventure By William Danks (SCA "Thorgeir Bjornsson")

From July 27 to August 12, 2018 I attended Pennsic War. It is a Society for Creative Anachronism (SCA) event that had just under 11,000 people in attendance. While there along I was able to work with a blacksmith from MN who uses a reproduction of a forge based on an Anglo Saxon dig. The Blacksmith I worked with goes by the name of Danr Ketilsmior in the SCA and runs a merchant booth at Pennsic selling his items. During the 2 weeks there I was able to spend some time working with Danr who let me assist him in the process of operating the forge at his shop Irontree Works.

During my time with Danr, the style of blacksmithing was medieval related. He shared knowledge of his forge which was an early period western European style that was very common. It is a side draft forge with 2 bellows. It has an addition for one person use since the use of slave labor is not legal anymore. With the addition one person can operate both bellows from either side of the forge. It makes for a very nice set up that I would like to try myself in the future.

While working with him he explained and showed me his story stick. This is something he says many old blacksmiths would have back in that time period as paper blueprints were not used. The story stick is a metal template that has holes to mark important places on the metal. We used a story stick to cut out pieces for 4" hinges. The complete 4" hinges were treated for protecting with a mixture that Danr came across. The mixture is equal parts of Beeswax, turpentine, and boiled linseed oil. The mixture will harden and needs to be melted before using.

I was informed by friends that Danr would was always willing to teach

new blacksmiths. I found him to be very knowledgeable and enjoyed explaining things to new blacksmiths. I have met several SCA blacksmiths who have invited me to their forges for more learning.

Other than working with Danr, Pennsic has a wide variety of shopping including blacksmith supplies. Several blacksmith merchants were in attendance including couple of previous Forge in Fire contestants. I was able to pick up a 4" Post Vise with all parts, and a few hand tools.

With the shopping and blacksmith learning I would consider Pennsic a complete success.
